The boy who fell from a rock face

In August 1969 a 13 year-old was taking part in a residential boys' camp in the Lake District. His day for rock climbing came. The group consisted of several leaders and about 20 teenagers. The main leader gave the usual advice: always maintain 3 points of contact, keep your hips close to the rock wall, use your legs to do the work... and off they went up different routes. This 13 year-old made his way halfway up the face. Suddenly he was in freefall.



Nowadays, every climber is belayed (secured) by a fellow climber on the ground. The climber's rope

runs up to the top of the cliff or wall, through a metal eye, and down to the partner on the ground. Back then, the practice seems to have been less safe: the partner was stationed at the top of the rock face, tethered to the ground, but had to take the full weight of any falling climber.

On this occasion, the partner at the top managed to save the 13 yearold, but at the cost of a nasty rope burn on his bare arm. His wound was not a pretty sight. As for the climber, he suffered the humiliation of being the only climber in the entire camp to have fallen, and the further humiliation of being mentioned by the main leader, without being named, to the entire group of 100 boys and leaders. How small he felt!

The boy that fell, in fact, was me. I'm glad to be able to say I've done some basic climbing walls successfully as an adult, and even done the leap of faith from the top of a telegraph pole. But the memory of that public embarrassment still occasionally surfaces.

At Easter Christians remember the path of physical suffering and public humiliation of Jesus.

Was this a failing on his part? No. Did he choose this path? Yes, because he could easily have kept quiet and gone against his conscience. The path of agony and rejection that Jesus took is something we can never fully grasp, because he was willing to be completely separated from God his Father, an agony much deeper than even crucifixion. Christians believe that the sacrifice of Jesus saves us from falling into the inescapable void, which we call sin.



But the greatest victory, the biggest triumph of all came on Day when Jesus rose from the dead. The power of death had been broken.

If you are tempted to think that the chances of a dead man coming to life again are zero, these are the common theories put forwards:

Swoon theory – Jesus had not actually died

• Wrong tomb – the followers of Jesus who found the empty tomb muddled the location

- Bribery the soldiers on guard were paid off by the disciples
- Robbery the body of Jesus was stolen

• Hallucination – Jesus' followers only imagined he had risen from the dead

Each of these alternative explanations needs a great deal of faith, given the inescapable conclusion in all four gospels: the empty tomb meant Jesus was alive again. Many people have set out to disprove the resurrection and come to realise that the risen Jesus is the only possible explanation.

Christians believe that the risen Jesus is therefore with us now, unseen until our eyes are opened to his presence. What do you believe?

Biggin Hill Cemetery/Burial Ground

We are privileged to have one of seven cemeteries within the Borough. It is described as being situated in a quiet 5 acre corner of Biggin Hill. First opened in 1930, it has 3,500 spaces for full memorial and lawn graves.

Early Christian writers were the first to use the phrase "burial ground", through the Greek word *Koimeterion* to mean "sleeping place, dormitory", from *koiman* "to put to sleep" *krimsir* "I lie down".

It was with this thought of, our loved ones, lying down and sleeping in this discrete enclave, that has driven us to work with the parks and cemetery team to improve and enhance this space. On checking back through the emails this quest started on 12 November 2015 with a header title of "I am on a sign mission!"

Today saw us in the pouring rain, with snow still visible on the ground, attend a progress meeting of works identified and commissioned.

We are pleased to see that the vehicle pathways have been extended to prevent tyre run off, saving the grass from being damaged.

The central island flower bed has been replanted with low maintenance shrubs that will provide, once established, all year colour and interest. Spring crocus, snowdrops and daffodils are all flourishing after some extra feed to promote growth.

The trees on King George VI Avenue have had the canopies lifted so that the horse drawn carriages have easy access and the planting of new trees to replace those blown down in the storms has taken place. It was a delight to see spring bulbs popping up their heads along the now mended metal fence.

The naturalised grass area to the rear, although looking scruffy at the moment, is doing its job providing a haven for insects, arthropods, birds and small mammals. A new interpretation board will be installed in April explaining the purpose of not mowing this area.

The site benches are waiting for some dry weather and the "community pay back" scheme to kick into action in May. We have found a pot of paint and the entrance gates are being rubbed down ready for a fresh coat of green paint in the very near future.

We still explore how to provide water facilities to the rear of the site, to make it easier to care for the graves. This work will continue until we find a solution as well as identifying the purpose of the stone hut and how it can be repurposed.

We thank the team for their continued efforts and support in endeavouring to maintain the area to provide for all, a way to grieve for our loved ones. It will always be difficult to manage the various ways in which people pay tribute and honour, friends and family when they, from the Greek word *Katapauo*, rest with us in Biggin Hill. But manage we must!

You can often help us by litter picking, trying to keep it neat and tidy.

And to turn back to November 2015, we are still waiting for our entrance sign but we have been assured that it is on its way!

Our meetings will be ongoing especially when the spring/summer grass cutting starts as this tends to cause the most upset and issues. Please as ever contact us should you need a particular grave to be looked at.

Our Day Centre is now one of only 2 such centres left in the whole of the London Borough of Bromley. Our expected defiicit for this financial year is expected to be over £20,000. Our main expenses are the cost of employing our care and kitchen staff and the monthly rent we pay to the London Borough of Bromley.

When Spring Arrives!



We wait in anticipation to what spring will bring, warmer temperatures, lighter evenings and the new shoots in the garden? Unless the actions of the winter weather have left a legacy of potential damage and shy growth. Climate change has resulted with different weather, to what we have been used to in past years.

However, all is not lost and gardeners can learn, adapt and be patient. Some plants

look damaged, dead or dying, wildlife have taken to

plants to eat as food is scarce and the garden is looking sad and unkempt. There is an urge to remove all dead looking plants or worse, giving up the garden. There is a way of determining whether you have lost your favourite plant by using the thumb nail test. At the base of the plant, scrap a small amount of bark off with your thumb or a sharp

knife. If the layer underneath is green, it is alive, if brown, it is possible it may be dead, but may sprout from the ground, particularly if it is a perennial (see photo)

Patience is a virtue, the ability to wait for something without getting angry or upset is a valuable quality of a gardener. There are other tasks in the garden that can be completed during March and early April, pruning and removing plants can wait.

Tidy the border, removing old leaves of the Hellebores to view the delicate flowers more clearly, untangle growth to allow the spring bulbs



to grow and flower without competition, defining the edge of the border and cut branches in bud of Forsythia, Ribes, Hellebores and daffodils to enjoy indoors.

The recent wet weather has enabled the soil to benefit from extra moisture, as we have had a dry February. Now is the time to feed plants with a granular feed such as bonemeal, Growmore or chicken pellets and add a mulch to our border using well-rotted garden compost or farmyard manure, (not fresh chicken manure), composted bark or leaf mould. Providing thick layers across the border to help seal the moisture in the ground for the following summer.

Check the greenhouse, plants saved over winter, may be starting to break into growth, remove all dead leaves to avoid disease spores spreading. Tidy the benches, floor, pots and prepare ready for sowing seeds etc because once warmth and longer daylight hours becomes regular, plants and weeds will grow vigorously.

The boy who sat on an unexploded bomb



This is David and Pat Wilkinson in their 1913 house in the Valley. The house has been in David's family since it was built.

Pat grew up on Bromley Common in a family of builders; her father and grandfather had a pig farm at Keston, where she moved. She was food supervisor in M&S Bromley, where discipline and a strict dress code was in place: long skirt, no ladders in stockings, hair tied up, and inspection each morning. To work on the shop

floor, you had to pass an English and Maths exam! She left M&S in 1966 to have her first child. In their front room she proudly pointed to a photo of her father in the RAF, North Africa. He won the DCM in 1943.

David's parents came from Maple Road, Penge; they rented the Biggin Hill house for 15 shillings & 6 pence per month from a German who had built it. A benefactor, Pa Sweeting, bought the house. Pa was a superintendent in the London wharfs, and was buying up lots of properties during 1920s at the time when plots of land were still being sold for £10. Pa Sweeting kindly left the house to David's mother! The house has changed little since then.

David was born in 1935. Not surprisingly, his most vivid memories are from the war years. War broke out when he was 4, but he wasn't evacuated unlike all his mates. His mother was in the WVS; their house was an ARP post. Their phone number was Biggin Hill 58. Invasion gear was stored in the back bedroom: hot water bottles, blankets, dried potatoes, dried egg. Locals would come there to sign on for watch duty. His father was unfit to fight as he had asthma, but worked round many munitions factories as a glazier.

His father raised money at concert parties at the WI: groups such as the Tin Hatters and the True Blues. For the Aladdin's Cave events, grown-ups made toys such as dolls and soldiers. While some lead soldiers were being made at his house, an accident involved molten lead being spilled all over the dining room table...

David's schooling started at the original Biggin Hill school; he would dodge falling bombs by using the air raid shelters under what is now the Waitrose car park; later he transferred to Quernmore Secondary School, Bromley, now Parish School, on London Lane.

When bad weather prevented children in the valley from going up Stock Hill, they would gather for lessons in the family house. David's neighbour used to live up Jewel's Hill: he and his sister would walk to Jail Lane school or Biggin Hill school, sometimes doing a double journey in the day if they went home for lunch!

Mr & Mrs Dark lived in the house over the road, where David spent lots of time with their son Peter. They had an air raid shelter. Mr Dark was in the RAF, often away from home. One day Peter Dark and David heard the air raid siren. They ran from near the airfield and jumped down into the air raid shelter. When the Germans bombed the aerodrome, they would attack from across the back of the valley, coming

over the fields. The boys' parents were distraught not knowing where the children were! One day a bomb hit the Darks' air raid shelter, blowing it up.



There we were sitting in the crater: Mrs Dark, her neighbour, my mother, and Peter and I sitting at the back with our thumbs up'



David aged about 5 or 6 sitting on top of a 500lb bomb, just along the road from his house. When the soldiers were digging the bomb out, the sergeant kept hitting the fin!

David remembers attending Sunday School, which took place at the back of the house called Troy, which still stands at the foot of Stock Hill. As a 12 year old he used to do a milk round on a Saturday morning, first milking the cows into buckets, then pressing cardboard tops onto the bottles, and loading them straight onto the cart. He recalls the

fairground which used to set up opposite the war memorial at the top of Jugg Hill. When three Gloster Meteors crashed in the Valley in June 1951, David witnessed the pilot of the first plane being carried out on a piece of corrugated iron.

David left school at 16, and became an apprentice blacksmith on Rolls Royce cars at James Young, Bromley. He soon left, wanting to enter the Services, and signed up at 18 as an RAF airframe engineer, taking 30 days to get to Singapore. He was in Singapore and Malaya for 2 ½ years working on monocoque Mosquitos. There he would read about changes in Biggin Hill while – his mother would send him the Bromley and Kentish Times, by ship.

David's father, Bert Wilkinson, helped Rev Vivian Symons move building materials from All Saints Peckham. He brought down the bell of All Saints with rope and tackle and, with a little pressure from the vicar, was one of the first to be confirmed in the new St Mark's. Like everyone in the Valley, his parents shopped at Temple's store at the foot of Stock Hill. Everything was sold there, food, hardware, the lot.

Once back from the Far East, David discovered his childhood sweetheart of 11 years was seeing another boy. It broke his heart! Later David met Pat at a friend's party, getting married within 16 weeks. Their first child was born just over a year later. A second German connection was his work in Keston, then Ightham, for Reuters, a German horticulture firm, specialists in rhododendrons. Reuter's parents had come to England when the Kaiser was recruiting the youth for the WW1. Both David and Pat worked for Reuters in the 1970s, and used to exhibit at the Chelsea Flower Show. David branched out into landscaping and tree felling. David and Pat moved back into the family home in 1977.



David showed me his copy of *Grandfather's Biggin Hill*, written by John Nelson in 1982. He darted from one page to another, using several views of the Valley to point out houses he knew as a boy, showing a precise knowledge of almost every building. He identified the house called Sunningvale, which is still there, also Blandford Villas, recently demolished. Admiring one house which no longer exists, David enthused: 'Look at the magnitude of the carpentry, the filigree, the fascia boards.' In fact, some

wooden houses arrived in kit form. David helped John Nelson with a few amendments to the 2010 edition of the book.

What were his feelings about the demolition of many old houses in the Valley in the late 1970s? He stated in no uncertain terms: 'It was the downfall and rape of a lovely country village, a population of 2,500, 5 butchers, a Co-op, a general store, and delicious bread from the baker's!'
