Meet the author of *Grandfather's Biggin Hill*Part 2



When John came into possession of the photographic dry plates in the late 1970s, he was fascinated by the vague images he could see when he held them up to the light. He had no idea how to produce photographs from them, but knew of a photographic shop on the corner of Widmore Road, Bromley, next to the old Police Station. John took some of the plates to the shop where the assistant assembled various trays, bottles of chemicals and packets of paper on the counter and proceeded to demonstrate how to carry out the photo printing process. Back home, John converted his loft

into a dark room and began producing photographs, the first results being quite amazing.

John Nelson's grandfather had come to Biggin Hill in 1903, dying in 1928. He was a highly professional photographer, but the quality of his work in Biggin Hill was limited because there was no electricity. His father, John's great-grandfather, Alfred Nugent Nelson, had been involved in the early days of photography starting off in Dublin in a company called Nelson & Marshall. His company took photos and supplied *cartes de visite*, to notable people including opera singers, and some of these cards are held in the collections of The National Gallery bearing the name Nelson & Marshall and The Royal Dublin School of Photography. He moved to London in the 1850s and built up a lucrative wholesale photographic business and studio in Twickenham but sadly went bankrupt after having failed to properly protect his inventions with patents. He had employed several of his children in his business and they all moved to other parts of the country to open their own photographic studios.

In this way John's grandfather, William Henry Nelson, came to Biggin Hill. He was told that the world was his oyster because Frederick Henry Dougal had bought the Aperfield Manor a few years previously in 1895 and people were coming to build their houses and settle in Biggin Hill.

At times when his regular work permitted, John's grandfather, in order to promote business, used to call on people in the village to ask if they would like him to take a photograph of them, perhaps working in their garden. 'A picture of your house? Bring the

family out and we'll do a photo. No obligation to buy!' Not everyone did buy the photographs but William survived comfortably, engaging with his principal source of income which was the making and selling of picture postcards of Biggin Hill and all the other villages around. He held a licence to sell postage stamps which was confirmation of his being a person of

character and integrity and John still has the original licence in his possession.

By the late 1970s people who had become aware of the existence of the photographic plates and developed photos, suggested to John he might give some illustrated local history talks to village groups. He transferred a number of the old photos on to slides, and also took up-to-date pictures of the same locations. With his projector and screen he was then able to give talks to a wide variety of local organisations which were much appreciated. At this point someone said, why don't you write a book? This project took a year, involving time spent on research in Bromley Library reading old newspapers and searching maps. It also entailed several visits to Kent Archives in Maidstone to bring to light the history of the Aperfield Estate going back to Norman times. There were also visits to Cudham and Downe churches and personal interviews with countless old Biggin Hill


Troy, still at the bottom of Stock Hill with permission of John Relson Stella, as has been said, was a very competent secretary, recorded his narrative in shorthand and

transcribed it. John decided to self-publish, and at Christmas 1985 *Grandfather's Biggin Hill* was on sale.

The books were printed in hardback and paperback and John was advised to have an extra thousand dust jackets printed. On the inside of the jacket was laid out some publicity

material and a purchase application form. John, Stella, their son Alex, their daughter Saralie and her boyfriend deposited one of these leaflets in the letterbox of every accessible house in Biggin Hill. Even before they got home from the first round of leafleting, they'd sold a dozen copies. At that Christmas husbands were buying the books as presents for wives and the wives buying them for their husbands. The first thousand copies were soon gone and eventually 2,500 were sold.

In 2010 there was a revised edition. Simon Finch, who worked for Bromley Council, told John that the Council had done a series of local histories, and wanted to reprint John's book as number six. John conducted an update on certain details, for example, one of the photos of a bungalow had been mis-identified in the first edition, the reason being that many bungalows came in kit form and therefore there was room for misinterpretation. An index, prepared by Simon Finch, was also included, and John sat for half a day signing copies of the new edition in Biggin Hill Library.



John remembers Rev Vivian Symons (1951-65) as inspirational, leading by example and encouragement. Going back further, he recalls Rev Kenneth Horner (1945-51) being very academic; Rev Raymond Allanson (1937-45)

residents. John's wife

and his daughter, Rosemary, being enormously funny; even further back he recites the reported infamous phrase by Rev Charles Bassett (1928-37): 'I preside over a parish of crooks and crocks.' There was apparently a meeting organised on Biggin Hill Green in response to this accusation, where the vicar was criticized for having said such words about respectable crooks! When Raymond Allanson was vicar during WW2, John and his brother Peter sang in the choir of the old St Mark's Church whilst their mother played the organ.

John recalls with fondness the spring and summer pre-war weekends when hundreds of cyclists came out from London up to Biggin Hill. There were various cyclists rests, from Leaves Green up to Westerham Hill, where riders could get their refreshments but also leave their bikes for a few pence, and go for walks to Tatsfield, Cudham, Knockholt, or Downe. Cyclists would pick bluebells and primroses and take them back home packed tightly in their saddlebags. Among the cyclists cafés The Teapot was the most popular, opened by a Belgian named Alphonse Haentjens who was one of thousands of Belgian refugees who escaped to England during WWI. Members of the RAF delighted in stealing the big red teapot from its stand on Main Road.

In days gone by, the surface of every side road in Biggin Hill during wet weather used to be covered in mud. John remembers Sutherland Avenue having deep ruts where the carts came through. People used to laugh at the thought of living in Biggin Hill, but now, with the new boundary changes, it will become an even more desirable place to reside: the parliamentary constituency of Bromley and Biggin Hill!


