Unbelievable Mistake During Take-off

It was a Monday evening in November 2014. It was dark and foggy.

A Gulfstream III business jet, bound for Newfoundland, was due to take off from Biggin Hill airport. The captain, age 36, had over 4,000 hours experience flying, the bulk in Gulfstream III. His co-pilot was less experienced. There were 5 passengers on board.

From the control tower came the message: 'Taxi and hold short at J1, runway 03.' They waited for clearance and performed the pre-flight checklist. Then came this message: 'We are having low-level fog patches at the airfield. Very low, very thin fog from the 03 threshold to approximately down the runway, then it looks completely clear.' Then from the Tower: 'Cleared for take-off runway 03, have a good flight.'

At 8.28pm the plane moved from Holding Point J1 and aligned with the runway. What they didn't know was that instead of aligning the plane with the centre of the runway, they had chosen the right edge, 3m to the right. As the plane picked up speed, the landing gear passed over the runway edge lights, but after 250m the tarmac ran out. The plane ended up on grass, the nose gear collapsed, and the flight was aborted.

The crew thought there was lighting down the centre of the runway, but this information was not available on their iPad app charts. They had the illusion they were in the centre. Fortunately all 7 people on board were unhurt, but the plane was a write-off.

The Christian faith has something important to say about direction, and how we are aligned. During our lives, we can imagine all sorts of things, but sometimes we find we are in the wrong place, or with the wrong people, or going the wrong way. Jesus said: 'I am the way, and the truth, and the life.'

CS Lewis observed that with teachings such as these, Jesus had to be either: mad, making himself so unique; or bad, because he was therefore misleading others; or he was God.

I hope your take-off into 2025 went well!

Frontline troops, including those in the trenches bravely fight on. Many families remain in temporary accommodation and they and others in their own homes are without power for up to 20 hours each day. These are wretched

conditions. Please once again reach out to them and demonstrate that we stand with them. The urgency for all medical

items has never been greater and the need for camping gear yet still also of the highest priority.



Priorities: Medical, camping gear, generators, food, items for babies are top priorities. FPV Drones, Generators, military uniforms and warm clothing and boots. Outdoor and waterproof clothing, T shirts, pants, workwear gloves.

Tents (2 to 8 man); Sleeping bags (all, preferably to -10c) Camp beds, mats, and Groundsheets, Bedding (single most urgent) Candles (used as the means of warming food in the trenches). Tinned items - fish, beans, soup, vegetables, potatoes and seasoning, salt, and pepper, rice, noodles, pasta packets or tinned and flour (sturdy containers) Other powdered food to add boiling water. Milk items: Evaporated or powdered milk, long life



milk, tea, coffee, cocoa, chocolate drinks, sugar. Nuts, dried fruit, energy bars, cereals, biscuits and peanut butter, jelly, and jam. Barocca calcium fizzy drink tablets and water purification tablets.

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The Story of the Blakes

Helena Blake was born in Old Tye Avenue in 1938, where she still lives. Her mother, Daisy, was from Bermondsey; her father, Arthur, had been born in Hillcrest Road in 1910. The couple moved into Old Tye the day they got married in 1937.



The Blakes were a well-known clan in the Village. Originally, her great-greatgrandfather had married in Biggin Hill in 1832 and was landlord of the original Black Horse! Helena's paternal grandfather was one of 8 Blakes. The family, 8 boys, had all lived in Biggin Hill at Mill House (as did Sheila Blundell!). Meanwhile, her paternal grandmother was one of 9 girls.

Arthur lived in seven different houses in Biggin Hill, which included Westacott, a farmhouse on the site of what was to be the airfield. He was one of the first pupils at Biggin Hill school on Main Road. As a boy, Arthur had got a Saturday job at Abbot's bakery by the school on Main Road when deliveries were done by horse and cart. Later he used his bike to go from house to house, out as far as Leaves Green and Tatsfield, as well as in the Village. He talked of the 1927 snow being up to the windows.



Later he was appointed as a police Special in the Village, investigating any military activity, for example

a plane crash. The deposit for the house in Old Tye came to £25 followed by the main payment, £400. He had said: 'I'm going to live here, and not go out till I'm in my box.' This turned out to be true.

At 18 months Helena went to live with the lady that had raised her mother, who had been orphaned at age 10. 'Nanny' lived in Yew Tree Cottage on

the corner of Melody Road and Spring Gardens. In 1942 Arthur was called up. As a professional cook, Arthur wasn't required for combat. In Scotland he trained to cater for 700 men in a field kitchen.

When living at Yew Tree Cottage, Helena remembers several tearful experiences of walking up from the Valley, her father in uniform, as he caught the bus to go on service. First he was sent to Italy, where he survived a torpedo

attack in the Mediterranean. He ended up in Naples, the year Vesuvius erupted! Next he was sent to India in 1944, returning two years later. Helena still has the letters he sent. She has great affection for her dad, and looked after him in Old Tye till he was 95. Arthur's brother Harold lived at the corner of Lusted Hall Lane, and Richard, another brother, ran the Sunningvale service station.

To get to school from Yew Tree Cottage, Helena walked up Polesteeple, or the Pinewoods at the beginning of The Grove. She was in the same class as David Watts. She went to Sunday School at the Baptist Church, run by Mr Sackett, held at what is now the Children and Family Centre, Churchside Close. This is where also Brownies met. In 1947, the year of the deep snow, she returned to Old Tye, attending Sunday School at the

Tin Tabernacle. She was confirmed at 13. She also learned craft at the house of Mrs Jones in Hillcrest Road.

Mother did her shopping at Temples Store. There were few other shops just after WWII, but several operated a delivery service.

After demobilisation, the first thing Arthur taught Helena was to ride a bike. At that time, Old Tye was covered in



pebbles. She and her friends used to ride right round the large Cedar Tree.

Helena went to Bromley Grammar School in Nightingale Lane. Pupils were then selected to do languages, otherwise needlework and cooking. Helena was one of 4 or 5 from Biggin Hill that year. One was Daphne Whitehead, related to Sheila Blundell. Until 1949 children of secondary age would stay on at the primary school till 14 or 15, but the year Helena started secondary, 1949, all Biggin Hill secondary children went to school in Bromley. West Kent Motors provided a coach service. Most boys went to Quernmore, girls to Burnt Ash.

Helena worked for 5 years at an accountant's in Widmore Road. To get to work, she bought a bike on HP from Watsons on The Pantiles: repayments were 10 shillings a week. She discovered the delights of cycling with friends to Eastbourne. In 1946 Brian Morris's family came to the Village. His mum was cook at Biggin Hill school. Brian had been a pupil at Beckenham Technical School, which transferred to Keston and was renamed Ravenswood School. As was often the case, Brian and Helena met at a dance at the W.I. Hall, and both had learned to dance under Shirley Cox. Brian and Helena were the first couple to get married in the new St Mark's.

Unusually, it took place on Sunday 14 June 1959. Both dads were afraid to ask for a Saturday off!

After a year Brian and Helena went to live in Southsea for 6 years, as Brian had been offered a job there. He specialised in domestic appliances, then deep freezers, which had just been developed. He went on to develop cold rooms,



blood banks and chilled computer rooms. The first supermarket Helena remembers was Victor Value in Portsmouth.



Brian loved technical hobbies: he built two racing cars, a trials car, and a scrambler bike. Helena did once have a go at grass track racing on the Layhams Road autocross circuit. Their boys, Ricky and Danny, learned to race cars; this took them all over the country. Sadly, Ricky died of Covid in 2020.

Brian decided to buy a

37ft cruiser which they kept on the Medway. This took them to France, the Channel Islands, Belgium and Holland. Once in the Channel near Le Havre, a rope got caught round the prop. Brian put a rope round his waist, dived down and cut the rope in two!

Helena found plenty to occupy herself: she worked in the kitchen at Biggin Hill and Cudham schools. Later she worked for Mr Marshall the chemist for 11 years.

In recent years Helena took over the running of the annual Biggin Hill Reunion from Sheila Blundell. The 2024 numbers were around 50.

Brian and Helena: Golden wedding

What has been the greatest pleasure for Helena living in Biggin Hill? She believes she grew up in the best period when there was the freedom as a child to walk anywhere in a village of about 1,000 inhabitants.

In early November my wife and I had the privilege to have a tour of St Mark's Church at Biggin Hill - The Moving Church - and we are grateful to Mrs Chris Reeks, the Church Administrator, for showing us around. How wonderful to see a relatively modern miracle of faith and God's provision.

Having been brought up in Cornwall I had often heard my mother speak of her cousin, The Reverend Vivian Symons and his project to move a Church from London to Biggin Hill - but for my mind, at the time as a teenager, I couldn't imagine someone undertaking such a task on one's own, indeed I had no concept; no idea of the complex work involved.

Then one day my mother announced that her cousin was visiting his parents and the family at Trenwheal, a small rural hamlet, not far from where we lived and that we had been invited for afternoon tea - that was probably in 1957. Arriving we were met by my great aunt, delighted to see us, and coming out of the workshop was my mother's cousin, Vivian, small of stature, to greet us too. To my surprise he was wearing his clerical collar, a cap on his head, in overalls and smoking a cigarette! As I recall he was telling my father he was seeking out some Cornish granite stone whilst he was down. My father, who would have known many quarries in the locality might have been of help, I am not sure. However, at St Mark's, Biggin Hill when I saw the bases in Cornish granite holding the candlesticks on the altar I confess I had to touch them and the beaten metalwork too. What an emotional delight!



Now retired myself from active Church ministry, I felt it would be inappropriate to leave without giving thanks for the work undertaken in the 50's as The Moving Church and so my wife, Dian, read some verses from the Psalms and I followed with a spontaneous prayer of thanksgiving for The Reverend Vivian Symons, his faith and diligence. I was standing in the place where he had prayed and preached oftennow that was a privilege!



Hedges With Environmental Benefits

New housing sites are emerging, and established properties are welcoming new owners. Installing driveways, enhancing privacy with fencing and new hedge rows. There is a rash of evergreen hedges starting to emerge, particularly the cherry laurel. It is warmly encouraging to see hedges planted but are we planting the right plant?

The cherry laurel, common laurel or Prunus laurocerasus, originally from



Eastern Europe and parts of Asia, has been with us since the late 19th century. They have scented flowers, glossy green leaves and produce berries. The flowers are adored by bees and butterflies, its dense structure offers winter protection to wildlife and berries are loved by birds and mammals. But it has its black side. It is poisonous and can be invasive if allowed, potentially harmful and will release cyanide gas, when cut or chipped through a chipper. The operator

could breath in the fumes and may cause dizziness. Therefore, if grown along boundaries, eaten by livestock, wildlife and pets,they could potentially become ill. It is invasive if not managed properly, a rapid grower, thrives almost anywhere and undergrowth becomes void over time. It can seed itself, spread by layering and can grow as high as trees. Keeping the hedge cut will not produce flowers or produce berries for wildlife.

Are there alternatives? Yes, there are many, both evergreen and deciduous, (loses leaves in winter). The following are just a few to consider.

The Portuguese laurel or Prunus lusitanica has dark green glossy leaves, non-poisonous berries and sweetly fragrant flowers, but is a slower grower. It originates from Portugal and Spain and will tolerate high temperatures and will provide a pleasant appearance.



Taxus baccata or common yew, historically used and still is in large estates and gardens, it is slow grower but provides privacy, is

evergreen and an excellent windbreak. It can be expensive if purchased as a large specimen but cheaper if bought root balled. Grows in a wide range of soils, except wet ground, offers protection and nesting opportunities for birds and mammals. The leaves are poisonous, so too is the seed within the red berry, however birds devour them.

Photinia 'Red Robin' is an evergreen with glossy green leaves and brilliant red young leaves. It behaves as a perfect hedging plant or specimen plant, exceptionally hardy and drought tolerant. Will need trimming twice a year to form a dense hedge. It has its flaws like any hedge, is prone to leaf spot, root rot and new growth may be damaged by frost.

Berberis stenophylla, produces a spiky dense habit hedge with nectar rich fragrant yellow flowers in late spring, early summer, followed by purple berries. It is an ideal plant for enhanced privacy and will grow in sun or shade.

The deciduous hornbeam (Carpinus betulus) and beech (Fagus sylvatica) hedge, have both been used extensively for decades, forming an excellent thick hedge and their leaves stay on well into winter. Far cheaper alternative to containerised plants, purchased as bare rooted plants, often used in many private gardens. Will form a decent hedge within five years, tolerates hard

pruning if required.

The ideal hedge for wildlife is a mixed hedge, comprising of hawthorn, field maple, blackthorn, beech, hornbeam, wild rose or spindle. Provides food for wildlife, shelter, habitats and rich nectar for pollinators. They too will enhance privacy and will blend in with surrounding hedgerows along country roads.



Before deciding, look around, visit gardens, ask homeowners before opting for the cheaper alternative that the nursery offers you. Whatever type of hedge is chosen, management is important for growth and quality of hedge.

When planting a hedge, ground preparation is crucial to ensure the plants establish well, by adding soil improvement such as well rotted compost or manure. Plant during autumn and winter, water the plants well prior to planting. If using bare rooted plants, soak them in water before planting. Dig the soil to a spade depth, creating a trench and place each plant 18" or 45cms apart, using a spade, moving the prepared soil around the root ball and firm with your foot. For bare rooted plants, plant them in a staggered line, 5 to each metre and water well afterwards. For containerised plants, preparation is the same, plant 75cms to one metre apart, depending on the size of plant. If planting out of season, ensure plants are well watered and a mulch will help establishment.
